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Foreword

The Bundick name seems to have been indigenous to the Eastern Shore of Virginia in early records. It has been found only twice in records elsewhere. In April 1635, William Bundock or Bundick was master of the ship, Hopewell of London, bound for New England (Hooten, pp. 44, 46, 49). Richard Hull gave Richard Bundick as one of his headrights, when he patented 300 acres on the north side of Mockjack Bay in Gloucester County, Virginia, on 13 August 1650 (Nugent I, p. 195). Since headrights could be collected before being used to patent land, it seems likely this was the same Richard Bundick who appeared in Eastern Shore records in 1647. No other record has been found of early Bundicks in other parts of Virginia. In local documents, the name has been spelled as Bundock, Bunduck, Bunducke, Blunducke, Bundike, Bundic, and the 1810 Federal Census for Accomack County called all the men of this name Bundicks.

The Bundicks of Accomack County, while all descendants of Richard Bundick, I, can be divided into four main groups, according to where they owned land. Richard Bundick, II, left land in Parkers Neck to son George. George's descendants there have been labeled The Metompkin Line. This branch has been researched and a report completed on 5 September 1993. Richard Bundick, II, also left son George land near Guilford and at Parksley. George's descendants in these areas are the subject of this study. Richard Bundick, II, handed down land in the Gargatha area to sons Richard, II, and Abbott. Abbott Bundick's line apparently died out with his children, while Richard, II, had a large number of descendants in the vicinity of Gargatha, many of whom settled near Modest Town and Nelsonia. His descendants apparently include William James Bundick (1829-1907), the writer's great-grandfather. Richard Bundick, III, 's son, John Bundick, settled in the area of Wachapreague and most of the Bundicks of Onancock, and points south, are his descendants.

All documentation in the following write-up refers to Accomack County records unless otherwise noted. A list of these records, and secondary sources that have been searched, is included at the end as references. Mr. Ralph T. Whitelaw, in Virginia's Eastern Shore, has made several small errors. On page 1175, he states that George Bundick bought land from Elizabeth Warrington in 1775. This should have been 1779 (Deeds 1777-1783, p. 200). On page 1117, Mr. Whitelaw states that Robins Hole Swamp was divided in 1787 between John A. Bundick's heirs and Richard Bundick, each getting 54 acres. The survey, of 23 April 1787, clearly shows this land divided, 54 acres each, between William Bundick and John Bundick, John A. Bundick's heirs, and land to the southwest then owned by Richard Bundick, Clk (Sur. Rec. #1, p. 59). A later survey gives Richard's part as $84\frac{1}{2}$ acres and this did not become merged with his other land as Mr. Whitelaw surmised. On page 1120, Mr. Whitlaw states that a Richard Bundick (wife Suke) died in 1790, leaving land in the Parksley area to son George for life, etc. This was the wrong Richard Bundick. He owned land at Gargatha. Richard, son of Tabitha, died intestate in 1805 (Orders 1804-1805, p. 225).

Attention is called to the fact that until January 1, 1752, the 25th of March was New Year's Day. January, February, and most of March, before this had the same year date as the preceeding December. The dates of documents used herein have been changed to agree with the present calender.

Undocumented information on the ninth, tenth, and eleventh generations has been provided by family members, including: Mrs. Rooker W. Hyslop, in a letter of 13 March 1982; Mrs. Howard Birch; and Mrs. Percy Thomas. Mrs. Robert Ross and Mr. Terry Thomas have helped in locating the Bundick land near Assawoman.

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Richard Bundick, I
The First Generation

The name of Richard Bundick first appears in Eastern Shore of Virginia records on 30 August 1647, as his name was given with eight other headrights when John Foster patented 450 acres of land in Northampton County (North Co. Deeds, Wills 1645-1651, p. 110). The land was located on the sea side, between Nassawadox and Machipongo (Whitelaw, p. 365 and map). A colonist was eligible for 50 acres of land for each person for whom he had paid transportation costs from England. These persons were called headrights, and had agreed to work for their sponsor for several years, as indentured servants, to pay back their cost of transportation. However, Richard Bundick likely paid for his own passage and assigned his right to 50 acres to John Foster.

Richard Bundick made a deposition in Northampton County Court on 21 June 1662, in which he gave his age as 41 years "or thereabout" (North Co. Order Book 1657-1664, p. 97). This indicates he was born circa 1620 and was 27 years of age when he came to the Colony of Virginia.

He had married by 28 October 1648, for on that date Richard Bundick and Dorothy Bundick, his wife, signed a bond with their marks, agreeing to pay John Foster for the use of a "servant" (North Co. Deeds, Wills 1645-1651, p. 163). No record has been found of Dorothy Bundick's maiden name. It appears likely she was a widow and owned property when she married Richard Bundick. Dorothy Bundick died between 23 May 1663, when she cosigned a deed with her husband (Deeds and Wills 1663-1666, p. 10), and 16 November 1665, when Ruth was "ye wife of Richard Bundick" (p. 103). Ruth had had two children before she married Richard Bundick, John Jones and Thomas Jones. Accomack County records speak of them at times as Bundicks (Wills, Etc. 1673-1676, p. 242). They apparently left no local heirs, as they were living in Sussex County, Pennsylvania (Delaware) in 1685, when

they sold land in Accomack County (Deeds 1676-1690, p. 408). Ruth Bundick was still living in 1680, when she signed a last deed with her husband (Deeds 1676-1690, p. 236), but apparently died soon thereafter. Richard Bundick named his third wife as Elizabeth in his will of 1692.

Richard Bundick was granted a patent to 650 acres of land on the south side of Pungoteague Creek on 21 November 1654 (Nugent I, p. 296), a patent that was renewed on 20 October 1661 (p. 412). He sold this 650 acres on Pungoteague Creek to Francis Moryson on 6 September 1672 (North. Co. Deeds 1668-1680, p. 36). On 23 May 1663, Richard Bundick, planter, and wife Dorothy deeded 500 acres on the south side of Pungoteague Creek to Richard Jacob, deceased, saying this land had been purchased from Nicholas Waddelaw (Wallop) and that they had "received full and valluable satiffaction for ye afsd 500 acres" before Jacob died (Deeds and Wills 1663-1666, p. 9 and 10). Witnesses to the deed were Evitt Jones and Thomas ffowkes. Richard Jacob's will, written 13 January 1663, recorded 2 March 1663, apparently left this land to a son Issac and spoke, in his will, of 350 acres he was leaving son Thomas "at Pungoteague on the western part of a main branch of said Creek whereon Richard Bundick presently lives" (North. Co. Deeds, Will, etc. 1657-1666, p. 140).

On 12 July 1664, Richard Bundick was granted a patent for 1400 acres in Accomack County, "at seaboard side beginning at land of Col Edmund Scarburgh, bounded south by Long tone (Long Love) Branch" (Nugent I, p. 524). One of his headrights was a William Wright. On 9 October 1672, Richard Bundick patented 600 additional acres "Being the surplus within bounds of his 1400 acres at Arcadia" (Nugent II, p. 119). This block of circa 2000 acres is presently called Parkers Neck. It is bound south and west by Parkers Creek, the northern branch of which, called Long Love Branch or Poorhouse Branch, crosses U.S. 13 just south of Zion Church. The creek to the north was originally Arcadia Creek and on present-day

maps is labeled Bundicks Creek.

On 18 December 1666, Richard Bundick and Ruth, his wife, sold to Thomas ffowkes 700 acres "of Land being the one half of a patent of ffourteen hundred acres granted to me at James City under the hand of ye Hon^{ble} William Berkeley and sealed wth ye seale of ye Colony the 12 July 1664" (Deeds and Wills 1663-1666. p 39 and 40). The consideration was "8000 pounds of tobacco & Cast, the value thereof in hand". On 14 February 1667, Richard Bundick and wife Ruth gave his daughter, Elizabeth Sturgis, 200 acres "next unto ye lands sold to Mr. Thomas ffowkes" (p. 63). On 16 December 1673, Richard Bundick and Ruth sold 550 acres to John Drummond, stating this was all that could be found of his 9 October 1672 patent (Wills, Etc. 1673-1676, p. 104). On 16 November 1677 Richard Bundick and wife Ruth gave his son Richard 200 acres "next to my son in Law John Sturgis - part of a 1400 acre Patent" (Wills & Deeds 1676-1690, p. 69). On 18 November 1680, Richard Bundick and wife Ruth sold to John Barns 300 acres for "tenn thousand ffour hundred pounds of good merchantable tobacco and cask - near Creek called by the name of Arcadia" (p. 236).

Richard Bundick lived to be an old man for the times. He would have been circa 72 when he wrote his will on 9 December 1692. It was recorded on 28 February 1693 (North. Co. Orders & Wills 1689-1698, p. 224). He owned no land at at this time and was apparently living in Northampton County. He called himself "Planter" and he named five children, each of whom was to receive 100 pounds of tobacco. His remaining estate, after debts were paid, was left to his wife Elizabeth and she was made executrix.

Richard Bundick's widow lived at least until 28 October 1698, when she made a gift of her entire estate to Mary Nottingham (North. Co. Deeds & Wills 1692-1707, p. 215). Mr. Whitlaw states (p. 329) that Mary Nottingham, wife of Richard Nottingham, Jr., "is said to have been born a Bundick". Since she was not named

by Richard Bundick in his will, it appears more likely Mary was a daughter of Elizabeth Bundick by a former marriage to an unknown man.

The children of Richard Bundick, I, as named in his will, all apparently born of his first wife Dorothy, were:

1. Richard Bundick, II, born circa 1656. See next section.
2. Elizabeth Bundick, married by February 1667, John Sturgis. John Sturgis died testate in 1684 (Wills & Deeds 1676-1690, p. 385). Elizabeth then married Thomas Jones.
3. Ann Bundick, married Thomas Nixon.
4. Dorothy Bundick.
5. Grace Bundick.

Richard Bundick, II
The Second Generation

Richard Bundick, son of Richard Bundick and his wife Dorothy, was born circa 1656. This birth year is based on his being 21 years old when his father deeded him Accomack County land in Parkers Neck in 1677. He would have married first circa 1680, but the name of this wife is unknown. He married secondly circa 1700, Susanna Justis, daughter of Ralph Justis and wife, Mary Abbott Justis. Ralph Justis had married circa 1675 (Justis booklet), so daughter Susanna was near the same age as Richard Bundick's oldest son George. Ralph Justis died testate in 1729, leaving property to Susanna Bundick's children when they "come to age or marry" (Wills 1729-1737, p. 47). He also named Abbott Bundick and Richard Bundick as grandsons and left them slaves.

On October 15 1691, Richard Bundick deeded John Barns the 300 acres his father had sold Barns in 1680, relinquishing any title he might have in the land (Wills & C Orders 1682-1697, p. 212). On 23 January 1689, Richard Bundick bought 200 acres "near the Seaboard" from Daniel Jenifer for 5600 pounds of good tobacco and cask, land to the north of "the Tann house branch" (Wills & Deeds 1676-1690, p. 491). On 10 December 1693, Richard Bundick bought another 74 acres from Daniel Jenifer, called Gargapha Savannah, for 2400 pounds of tobacco (Wills and Etc 1692-1715, part 1, p. 69). This land was near the last purchase. Richard Bundick purchased 299 acres near "Gilford Creek" for 5000 pounds of "Tobacco and Casq^e" from Edward Nixon, "Tanner" on 18 January 1701 (p. 394). He then owned 773 acres. The Quit Rents of Virginia in 1704 shows Richard Bundick of Accomack County, the only Bundick listed, as being taxed for 773 acres in that year (p. 14).

Richard Bundick, II, sold no land. He did give away two 100-acre tracts in May of 1728, one "near Guilford Branch", to daughter Susanna Onions and her

husband John Onions (Deeds Wills Etc 1715-1729, part 2, p. 206) and 100 acres near Gargatha to son Richard Bundick, Jun^r (same page).

Richard Bundick made his will on 23 May 1731 and it was recorded on 6 July of the same year (Deeds & Wills 1729-1739, part 1, p. 153). He left son George Bundick his home plantation of 200 acres and made him his executor. He gave son Abbott (under 21) 100 acres in the woods near Gargathy. He left 73 acres on Gargathy Branch to grandson, William Bundick Pearson. Son Justis Bundick (under 21) was to inherit 100 acres near Guilford. Son George was left the remainder of Richard's land "at the head of Guilford". He named five living daughters, three of whom were married, but no wife. It appears his second wife, Susanna Justis Bundick, was deceased before her father wrote his will in 1729. Richard Bundick, II, divided personal property between his children, but did ^{not} own slaves.

The children of Richard Bundick, II, as named in his will, were:

1. George Bundick, born circa 1680, died testate 1764 (Wills 1761-1767, p. 244).
2. Daughter Bundick, born circa 1682, married circa 1705, _____ Pearson.
3. Ann Bundick, born circa 1685, married _____ Abbott.
4. Susanna Bundick, born circa 1700, married John Onions.
5. Richard Bundick, III, born circa 1705. See next section.
6. Mary Bundick, born circa 1707, married Thomas Evans.
7. Abbott Bundick, born circa 1710, died testate 1784 (Wills 1784-1787, p. 48).
8. Tabitha Bundick, born circa 1712.
9. Keziah Bundick, born circa 1713.
10. Justis Bundick, born circa 1715, died testate 1769 (Wills 1767-1772, p. 252).

George Bundick
The Third Generation

George Bundick, oldest son of Richard Bundick, II, and an unknown wife, was born circa 1680. His birth year is estimated from the fact he had married by 2 April 1706. On that date, John Abbott, Sen^r, of Accomack County, planter, gave to his daughter, Elizabeth Bundick, "now wife of George Bundick" 100 acres "on ye south side of Back Creek branch w^{ch} was given to me by my father John Abbott in 1688" (Wills & Etc 1692-1715, part 2, p. 188). On 4 February 1718, George Bundick bought 100 adjoining acres from John Abbott of Somerset County, in province of Maryland, son and heir of Robert Abbott, deceased (Deeds, Wills & Etc 1715-1729, part 1, p. 99). George Bundick then owned 200 acres of land in the area of present-day Parksley (Whitelaw, p. 1120), before his father died in 1731, leaving him 200 acres in Parkers Neck and circa 100 acres near Guilford Creek. On 28 January 1755, George Bundick and wife Elizabeth deeded the latter, as 100 acres, here called Robins Hole Swamp, for 20 pounds, to John Abbott Bundick (their son) and to Richard Bundick (their grandson) (Deeds 1746- 1757, p. 543).

George Bundick, like his father and grandfather, lived to be an old man. His son and namesake had died 13 years before he made his will on 28 June 1763. It was recorded on 23 February 1764 (Wills 1761-1767, p. 244). He left son John Abbott Bundick the 200 acres "on the seaside where I now live" and made him executor. He gave grandson Richard Bundick (son of his deceased son, George Bundick, Jun^r) 200 acres "where he now lives provided he let his mother, Tabitha Bundick, have a quiet & peaceable living during her widowhood". George Bundick's wife had apparently predeceased him, as she was not named in his will. Two daughters were also deceased. He divided personal property between his son, his grandson, Leah Townsend, daughter of Henry Townsend, daughters Susanna Sturgis

and Rachel Satchell, and granddaughters Elizabeth Stephens and Betty Turnell.

He did not own slaves.

The children of George Bundick and his wife, Elizabeth Abbott Bundick, were:

1. George Bundick, Jun^r, born circa 1710, died testate 1751 (Wills 1749-1752, p. 259), married circa 1732, Tabitha _____.

George Bundick, Jun^r, the older son of George Bundick and his wife, Elizabeth Abbott Bundick, was born circa 1710. He would have married circa 1732, Tabitha _____. His wife's given name is first found on 21 August 1751, when George Bundick, Jun^r's inventory was returned by his executors, Tabitha Bundick and Richard Bundick (Wills 1749-1752, p. 290), and again when his father's will was recorded in 1764, at which time she had not remarried. Her maiden name has not been found.

George Bundick, Jun^r inherited no land, for he died before his father. He apparently lived on his father's land, in an area that became present-day Parksley, for this was where his widow and son were living when his father died in 1764.

George Bundick, Jun^r wrote his will on 14 April 1751 and it was probated on 30 July of the same year (Wills 1749-1752, p. 259). He left personal property to son Richard Bundick and to daughters Ann Bundick and Elizabeth Bundick. He left the use of his personal estate to his unnamed wife, during her widowhood, and then to his children. He made his wife and son Richard his executors.

The children of George Bundick, Jun^r and his wife Tabitha were:

1. Richard Bundick, born circa 1732. See next section.
2. Ann Bundick, born circa 1736.
3. Elizabeth Bundick, born circa 1740.

Richard Bundick, the only son of George Bundick, Jun^r and his wife, Tabitha Bundick, was born circa 1732. He would have been circa 19 years of age when his father died in 1751, and 23 years old in 1755, when his grandparents, George and Elizabeth Bundick, deeded the 100 acres called Robins Hole Swamp to him and his uncle, John Abbott Bundick, for 20 pounds (Deeds 1746-1757, p. 543). He likely married circa 1755, but the name of his wife has not been found. He could have married Rachel Andrews, a daughter of Richard Andrews, who died testate in 1759, naming a granddaughter as Rachel Bundick (Wills 1757-1761, p. 126). A Rachel Bundick witnessed his will and that of William Andrews in 1763 (Wills 1761-1767, p. 225).

Richard Bundick would have been circa 32 years of age when he inherited the 200 acres from his grandfather George in 1764, land "where he now lives". A survey of this land after his death shows the 200 acres were actually 221 acres (Sur. Rec. #3, p. 115). It was later to become the eastern part of present-day Parksley (Whitelaw, p. 1120). The same survey shows that Richard's part of Robins Hole Swamp contained $84\frac{1}{2}$ acres and that it was a separate track located near Guilford.

Richard Bundick's name appears on the 1784 tax list and on a survey (Sur. Rec. #1, p. 59) as "Clk". No explanation for this designation after his name has been found. The records have been searched, looking for his appointment, as clerk, to some office; to no avail. It seems certain it was used to distinguish him from Richard Bundicks of other Accomack Parish areas. In 1784, he owned five slaves, four horses and eleven cattle. He was taxed 3 pounds 11 shillings 3 pence on his real estate and 2 pounds 10 shillings 9 pence on personal property.

By the time the Federal Census was taken in 1800, Richard Bundick, Sen^r was

over 45 years of age (actually circa 68). He then owned six slaves. Another male in his household was 16 to 26 years of age and the only female was 26 to 45.

Richard Bundick had died intestate by 27 February 1805, when William Grinnalds was named to administer his estate (Orders 1804-1805, p. 225). William Grinnalds returned an audit of the estate on 28 June 1805 (Wills 1804-1806, p. 507), and a division of the personal property was made on the same date (p. 508). It is apparent that Richard Bundick's wife was deceased by 1805, for his personal estate was divided between four children, each of whom received 76 pounds 9 shillings 4 pence.

The lands of Richard Bundick were surveyed on 24 September 1805, for a division among his heirs (Sur. Rec. #3, p. 115). The four children of deceased son George Bundick got 20 to 25 acres each, totaling 90 acres. William Grinnalds and wife Nancy got $70\frac{1}{2}$ acres, and Arthur Vefsels (Wessells) and wife Betsy received $60\frac{1}{2}$ acres. $84\frac{1}{2}$ additional, separate acres "lying Robins Hole near Guilford", went to Richard Bundick, son of Richard.

The children of Richard Bundick and an unknown wife were:

1. George Bundick, born circa 1758. See next section.
2. Nancy Bundick, born circa 1762, married circa 1782, William Grinnalds.
3. Richard Bundick, Jun^r, born circa 1766, died testate 1818 (Wills 1818-1819, p. 125), married circa 1787, Rachel (Fitchett?). Richard Bundick, Jun^r left his "plantation called Robin Hole", of 80 acres, to his son, Richard A. Bundick. He named another son as John T. (F?) Bundick, his wife as Rachel, and a daughter, Damaris Bundick. Richard's widow, Rachel Bundick, made her will on 7 August 1820 and it was probated on 25 February 1822 (Wills 1821-1823, p. 125). She named the same three children. Rachel left land to son John F. Bundick, saying he was under 21 years of age, and other land to daughter Daisy Parks, "now wife of Benjamin Parks". She also named a granddaughter, Eunice P. Rogers.

Rachel's land was surveyed on 13 March 1822 and it contained 41 acres 3 roods and perches. She had sold 6 acres to Southy Taylor and 8 acres were to go to son John F. Bundick, while the balance was to be sold at public auction. Her land was located $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles "in a south direction from Guilford" (Sur. Rec. #5, p. 100). The children of Richard Bundick, Jun^r were:

A. Daughter Bundick, born circa 1790?, married circa 1810?, _____ Rodgers.

B. Richard A. Bundick, born circa 1795, died testate 1824 (Wills 1823-1824, p. 386), married by bond of 11 July 1821, Ritta Annis, daughter of Levin Annis (MLB 1806-1832, p. 24). Richard A. Bundick and wife Ritter Ann sold "land left him by Richard's father, between head of Guilford Creek and Back Creek", to Major Mason on 13 December 1822 (Deeds 1822-1824, p. 157) and more of the same land to Major Mason on 28 January 1823 (p. 198). Richard A. Bundick left, by will, the entire balance of his estate to his wife, Ritter Bundick. He apparently had no children. Ritta Bundick, "widow of Richard", married Robert Barnes, widower, by bond of 27 March 1826 (MLB 1806-1832, p. 10).

C. John F. (Fitchett?) Bundick, born circa 1803. John F. Bundick apparently inherited only 8 acres from his mother in 1822, at which time he was underage. Between 24 January 1824 and 8 April 1824, John F. Bundick sold a total of 123 acres of land (Deeds 1824-1825, p. 7, p. 54, p. 115, p. 522). He sold 8 acres for \$32 to Samuel Taylor. He sold 60 acres to Raymond Riley (his mother's executor - this could have been a mortgage), land "bound on the east by part of tract divided to Dany Parks by will of Rachel Bundick", and he sold Gillet Young, in two deeds, a total of 55 acres. After 1824, John F. Bundick apparently disappeared from Accomack County records. He was unmarried when he sold his land and no marriage record for him has been found.

D. Damaris/Daisy/Damy Bundick, born circa 1800. Damy Bundick, "daughter of Richard", married Benjamin Parks, "son of Benjamin", by bond of 19 December

1818 (MLB 1806-1832, p. 100).

4. Betsy Bundick, born circa 1770, married by bond of 8 January 1794,
Arthur Wessells (MLB 1774-1806, p. 31).

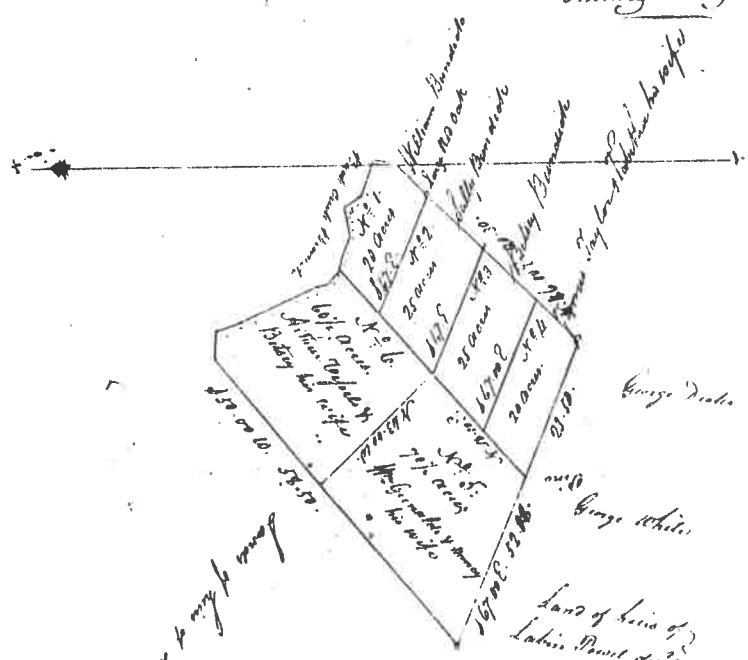

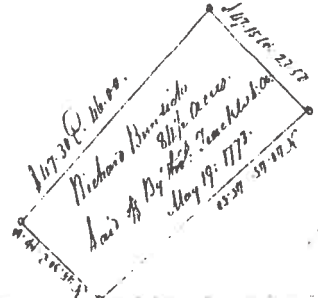

George Bundick of Richard
The Sixth Generation

George Bundick, the older son of Richard Bundick, was born circa 1758. His name appeared directly under that of Richard Bundick, Clk, in the 1784 tax list as "George Bundick, his son", indicating he had married and was head of a household by that year. He owned only two horses and was taxed 14 shillings. He would have married circa 1779 (son William born in 1780). His wife was another Tabitha Bundick, whose maiden name is unknown.

The 1800 Federal Census lists "George Bundick, Rich. Clk" as 26 to 45 years of age (42?). He had one other male in his household, at 16 to 26 years, and five females, one being his wife, also 26 to 45 years. Two females were under 10 years, one was 10 to 16 and another 26 to 45 years.

George Bundick died intestate the year before his father, for, on 31 October 1804, his widow, Tabitha Bundick, qualified to administer his estate (Orders 1804-1805, p. 148). Tabitha Bundick made her will on 1 January 1818 and it was recorded on 25 February 1818 (Wills 1817-1818, p. 333). She left personal property to three of her children and the remainder of her estate, both real and personal, was to be divided between all her children. George and Tabitha's four surviving children inherited a total of 90 acres from his father in 1805.

The children of George Bundick of Richard and his wife, Tabitha Bundick, were:

1. William Bundick of George, born 1780. See next section.
2. Tabitha/Tabby Bundick, born circa 1782, married by bond of 1 June 1804, James Taylor (MLB 1774-1806, p. 29).
3. Sally/Sarah Bundick, born circa 1785. She chose her uncle Richard as her guardian in 1805 (Orders 1804-1805, p. 333). Sally Bundick sold 24 acres to Edmund Parks for \$330 on 4 September 1841 (Deeds 1841-1842, p. 444). She died intestate, unmarried, by 27 February 1843, when her estate was to be administered

by her brother, William Bundick of George (Orders 1842-1845, p. 130).

4. Betsy Bundick, born circa 1792. Betsy chose Ephraim Wessells as her guardian in 1805 (Orders 1804-1805, p. 333). She married William Satchell, son of George Satchell, by a bond of 18 May 1815 (MLB 1806-1832, p. 111).

5. Daughter, born circa 1795, deceased by 1805.

The Seventh Generation

William Bundick of George was born in 1780, according to his tombstone on route 176, on the outskirts of Parksley, toward Accomack Wayside. His stone gives his death in 1860 at 80 years. It stands with his wife's stone, along a ditch on the north side of the road. Polly Bundick's stone states she died in 1861, but her age cannot be read, for the bottom of the stone is under the ground. (See note).

William Bundick of George was a grown man in 1804, when his father died. He inherited 20 acres of his grandfather's land in 1805. He sold this tract, as 21 acres, to James Taylor, for 78 pounds, on 27 February 1809 (Deeds 1807-1810, p. 257). This was part of 221 acres that had been owned by his Bundick ancestors since 1688 and 1718 and even longer by his Abbott ancestors.

William Bundick of George married Polly Davis, "daughter of Henery", by a bond of 23 June 1814 (MLB 1806-1832, p. 24). The marriage took place on 25 June 1814 (Mar. Reg. #1, p. 18). He would have been 34 years of age when he married.

The 1820 Federal Census lists William Bundick of George as 26 to 45 (40) years of age. He had two females in his household of 26 to 45 years and two others under 16 years. There were also two males in the household, one under 10 years and another between 10 and 16 years. William Bundick of George owned two slaves in 1820. By 1850, William Bundick was a 66-year-old farmer (70 years?). His wife Polly was 55, daughter Tabitha was 27, and sons John and Thomas, 15 and 12 years, respectively.

William Bundick of George was exempted from paying taxes on 29 March 1852 "by reason of age and infirmity" (Orders 1851-1854, p. 175). The Register of Deaths reports that he died on 18 May 1860, at 80 years.

The 1860 census gives Polly Bundick, at 69, as head of a household that included her daughter, Tabitha Bundick, at 42 years, and son, Thomas Bundick, at 26 years. Polly Bundick, widow of William, died in 1861 (Orders 1860-62, p. 464).

William Bundick of George did not leave a will, nor did his wife. John E. Wise was administrator for them both (Orders 1860-1862, p. 92 and p. 464). All six of their children were named in a deed of 25 February 1863, when they sold 25 acres to Zorobabel Mason "known as the Benjamin Parks land and formerly owned by William Bundick of George" (Deeds 1862-1865, p. 90). Sons George H. Bundick and wife Ann and William Bundick, of Princess Anne County, Virginia, with his wife, sold to their brother, Thomas Bundick, their undivided part of 72 acres, formerly owned by William Bundick of George, on 31 May 1864 (p. 427) and on 16 August 1864 (p. 439), each for \$260.

William Bundick of George had bought 7 acres on 12 June 1821 from James and Nancy Davis for \$180 (Deeds 1821-1822, p. 277). He bought 30 acres on 5 February 1827 from Benjamin Parks and wife Damey for \$105 (Deeds 1825-1827, p. 487). He bought 3 acres from Leah Rew on 30 December 1830 for \$18 "where said William now lives" (Deeds 1830-1832, p. 84). On 1 February 1845, William Bundick of George bought 35 acres from Richard J. Rew and wife Nancy for \$500, land near the Poor House and William of George's other land (Deeds 1844-1846, p. 261). There seems little doubt but that the tombstones of William Bundick and wife Polly stand on land he owned.

An item of interest has been found in Accomack County Levy Papers 1805-1835, which include the Poor House accounts. In 1832, William Bundick (of G) was to be paid for "rying(?) & carting wheat for the use of the P. House" (Loose Papers).

The children of William Bundick of George and his wife, Polly Davis Bundick, were:

1. George H. Bundick, born 1815. See next section.
2. Tabitha Bundick, born circa 1823 (1850 census), died 5 March 1898, aged 80 years (Pen. Ent., March 12, 1898 issue). This notice of Tabitha Bundick's death says she was a sister of John Bundick and Thomas Bundick, obviously unmarried.
3. William Bundick, born circa 1824 (1850 census). William Bundick and wife, of Princess Anne County, Virginia, sold 1/6 of the land that had belonged to William Bundick of George to brother Thomas Bundick, on 31 May 1864 for \$260 (Deeds 1862-1865, p. 439). The 1850 census for Princess Anne County gives a William Bundick, a 26-year-old farmer, with wife Femmy, 38. They had no children in their household in 1850.
4. Margaret Bundick, born circa 1829 (1850 census). Margaret Bundick married Thomas Dix by a Somerset County, Maryland, licence of 29 November 1849 (Som. Co. Mar. Rec 1796-1871, p. 39). The 1850 census for Accomack County shows Thomas Dix, 33, a shoemaker, with wife Peggy, 21. In 1860, they had a daughter Polly Dix, 10, and son John Dix, 5.
5. John Bundick of William, born 15 April 1832, died 16 August 1913, according to his tombstone in Parksley Cemetery (Graven Stones, p. 40). John W. Bundick, 26, married Lovey F. Hickman, 23, (1838-1919) on 26 December 1861 (Mar. Reg. #3, p. 12). Among their children was a daughter, Polly Ann Bundick (1870-1964), who married William Thomas Bundick in 1892. They were the parents of Paul Bundick, Ryland Bundick, Blanche Bundick West and Elise Bundick Justis Dukes, all of whom lived at Nelsonia. Other children of John Bundick of William were: William Bundick, born circa 1865; Washington (Columbus?) Bundick, born circa 1869; Maggie Bundick, born circa 1873; Emma Bundick, born circa 1875; Isabelle Bundick, born circa 1878 (all of these from 1880 census) and John F. Bundick, born circa 1882 (1900 census).

6. Thomas Bundick, born 9 November 1836, died 12 September 1924, according to his tombstone in Parksley Cemetery (Graven Stones, p. 41). Thomas Bundick, 24, married Mary E. Sparrow (1844-1913), "daughter of James A. and Ann Sparrow", on 27 December 1860 (Mar. Reg. #3, p. 11). Thomas Bundick of W. died testate in 1924, naming his children as: William T. Bundick (married Sallie D. Wright in 1889 - Mar. Reg. #4, p. 103), Sadie Marshall, Alice Justis (married Edward B. Jusis in 1886 - #4, p. 86), Mary E. Watts (married John D. Watts in 1890 - #4, p 105), Edward J. Bundick, John D. Bundick, and Oscar L. Bundick (married Ella Mason in Worcester County in 1902). Thomas Bundick of W. also named two grandchildren as John Scott and Otis Scott (Eva Bundick married Morris E. Scott in Worcester County in 1893) (Wills 1920-1928, p. 230).

Note: Since the tombstones in Upper Accomack County were recorded in the early 1980s, these two old stones have been replaced with a modern one, which reads - William Bundick, 1780-1860, and his wife, Polly Bundick.

George H. Bundick
The Eighth Generation

George H. Bundick, the eldest son of William Bundick of George and his wife, Polly Davis Bundick, and apparently named for his two grandfathers, was born in 1815, according to his age when he married the second time. The notice of his death at 82 appears in the 16 January 1897 issue of the Peninsula Enterprise. This article reports he died at his home at Pastoria on the last day of 1896. No tombstone has been found for him or either of his wives. He did not leave a will, nor has an administration been found.

George Bundick of William married (1) Ann Wessells, "daughter of Isaac", by a Worcester County, Maryland, licence of 2 January 1837 (Wor. Co. Mar. Rec. 1795-1865, p. 128). Mrs. Annie Bundick died at the residence of her son, Mr. George Bundick, on 3 May 1884, at 70 years (Pen. Ent., 10 May 1884 issue). George H. Bundick, "son of William and Polly Bundick", at 73 years, married (2) 12 September 1888, Mary Dix, 63, "daughter of George and Sally Dix" (Mar. Reg. #3, p. 97).

The 1850 Federal Census for Accomack County, Accomack Parish, shows George H. Bundick, aged 37, as head of household 315. His wife, Ann Bundick, was also 37 and they had six children: Mary at 12 years, Thomas aged 11, Elizabeth at 9 years, George at 6 years, Margaret of 4 years, and 1-year-old William.

In 1860, George H. Bundick was head of household 166/180 in St. George Parish, near Accomac. His age was given as 44 years and his wife's as 46. They had the same children in their household, with the exception of their eldest daughter Mary.

No record has been found of George H. Bundick buying or selling land. The census records all report he owned no real estate.

The children of George H. Bundick and his wife, Ann Wessells Bundick, were:

1. Mary Bundick, born circa 1838 (1850 census). Mary J. Bundick, 24, "dau-

ghter of George and Ann", married 22 March 1861, Samuel Kelly, 22, son of Thomas Kelly (Mar. Reg. #3, p. 12).

2. Thomas Bundick, born circa 1839 (1850 census). Thomas Bundick, 23, "son of George and Annie", married 21 February 1867, Mary Wessells, 20, daughter of Ephraim and Mary Wessells (Mar. Reg. #3, p. 20). Thomas Bundick died testate in 1892, leaving his entire estate to his wife, Mary A. Bundick (Wills 1882-1901, p. 497). In 1880, there were three daughters in their household: Sarah A. of 9 years, Willie at 7, and Maggie at 2 years.

3. Elizabeth Bundick, born circa 1841 (1850 census). Elizabeth Bundick was listed as 18 years of age in her parent's household in 1860. No marriage or other, later record of Elizabeth Bundick has been found. There is a small, older, tombstone, with no dates, in the Bundick plot at Assawoman Church, which reads: Elizabeth, wife of George Graff Bundick. Accomack County records show no George Graff Bundick. Should this have been: Elizabeth Bundick, wife of George Graff? There were no Graffs in Accomack County or Somerset and Worcester Counties, Maryland, either. If this stone marks the grave of Elizabeth, daughter of George & Ann Bundick, she was likely moved here from down the county sometime after 1906, when her nephew bought land near Assawoman and later moved his father's grave here.

4. George Bundick, born circa 1844 (1850 census). See next section.

5. Margaret Bundick, born circa 1846 (1850 census). Margaret Bundick, 19, "daughter of George H. and Annie", married 6 May 1866, John W. Barnes, 21 (Mar. Reg. #3, p. 18).

6. William Bundick, born circa 1849 (1850 census). William Bundick, 23, "son of George and Annie", married 10 September 1874, Anna Lewis, 21, daughter of Levin and Rhoda Lewis (Mar. Reg. #3, p. 40). The census of 1880 and that of 1900 show only one daughter born of this marriage: Annie George Bundick, born May 1884.

George Bundick, son of George H. Bundick and his wife, Ann Wessells Bundick, was born circa 1844, according to both the 1850 and 1860 census. George Bundick, son of George, died on 10 May 1884, at 36 years of age, leaving a widow, Margaret Bundick (Reg. of Deaths). The Peninsula Enterprise reported his death in their May 31, 1884 issue. This record says George Bundick was an industrious farmer and very worthy citizen, who died at his home near Drummondtown (Accomac) on 24 May 1884, aged about 40 years. Family members say that his children were born near Tasley.

Local records continued to call this man George Bundick, when the census of 1870 gave his age as 25, an unmarried head of a household in St. George Parish, and that of 1880, which indicates he was born in 1846 and shows him head of a household in Lee District. His tombstone, in Assawoman Methodist Church Cemetery, gives his name as George H. Bundick, his birth in 1848 and death in 1884. Since his remains had to have been moved to Assawoman, perhaps the birth date on his stone is inaccurate. However, his family has a framed memorial honoring him which gives his birth on 31 May 1848 and death on 24 May 1884.

One other record that does not quite agree is: George Bundick, 24, "son of George and Annie", married Maggie Satchell, 17, "daughter of William and Eliza Satchell", on 14 December 1871 at Onancock (Mar. Reg. #3, p. 32), while family records show that George Henry Bundick married Margaret Hester Satchell on 14 December 1870.

On 24 December 1883, George Bundick bought 100 acres of land from Sallie E. Slocomb of Worcester County, Maryland, for \$1200 (Deeds 56, p. 318). He gave Mrs. Slocomb a bond for \$100 on the same day, putting up the land as collateral (p. 319). This farm was "near the village of New Church, on the road to

Horntown", bordered on the south by the road, on the west by William H. Marshall's land, and on the east by Solomon Marshall's heirs. This is the present home farm of William C. Carey, Jr. On the same day, Sallie E. Slocomb sold to James E. Justice, land on the opposite side of the road, land presently owned by H. Robert Tull (p. 316). James E. Justice had married Elizabeth T. Satchell in 1869. His wife and George Bundick's wife were sisters.

On 10 February 1886, Alfred J. Lilliston, administrator of George H. Bundick, deceased, paid to Sally E. Slocomb \$434 91/100, on the debt to her, "said amount being the full balance in said administrator's hands" (Deeds 59, p. 25). This land was sold at public auction on 6 June 1891 and Sally E. Slocomb bought it back for \$860 (Deeds 63, p. 413). James E. Justice and his wife Elizabeth sold the farm on the opposite side of the road to William J. Ardis in 1888 (Deeds 60, p. 328).

George Bundick was the third man of this Bundick line who died before his father. Besides his widow, he left five children, the eldest only 12 years of age and the youngest at 1 $\frac{1}{2}$. Since there is no 1890 census, the family cannot be located again until 1900. It is evident that George Bundick had not moved his family to New Church before he died, for the record of the sale of his personal property on 11 November 1884 gives the names of people who bought as lower Accomack County people (Inv. 1882-1886, p. 454). It is possible that Margaret Satchell Bundick then moved her family to New Church, to live near her sister and brother-in-law, for the family relates that she farmed to raise her children. A Horntown Methodist Church record shows her eldest son a member of a Sunday School Class there in 1891 and his baptism there on 8 November 1896 (Downings Methodist Church Records).

The 1900 census shows the family in Atlantic District and, from the names of neighbors, they were living near Temperanceville. Margaret Hester Satchell, wife

of George H. Bundick, was born in 1853 and died in 1927, according to her tombstone in Assowoman Methodist Church Cemetery. She had lived to raise her own children and help raise grandchildren. After her children married, she continued to make her home with her eldest son, G. Henry Bundick. Her obituary states she died at his home, near Assowoman, on 14 April 1927 (Pen. Ent., 16 April 1927 issue).

The children of George H. Bundick and his wife, Margaret Hester Satchell Bundick, were:

1. George Henry Bundick, b. 13 January 1872. See next section.
2. Calvin Thomas Bundick, born 23 July 1875, died 30 June 1952. Calvin T. Fletcher, 26, married Sadie E. Richardson, 22, on 31 December 1902 (Mar. Reg. #4, p. 82). Calvin Bundick had one daughter, Lena Mae Bundick (1903-1983), who married Arthur D. Fletcher (1905-1989) of Wattsville. (Wills 26, p. 255).
3. Crissie May Bundick, born 1 March 1878, died 4 December 1948. Crissey M. Bundick, 18, married (1) Thomas L. Mariner, 24, in Worcester County, on 10 January 1891 (LESMR 1865-1906, p. 60). She apparently married (2) Edward T. Bundick, widower, and father of Clinton C. Bundick (her mother's obituary). Christine M. Mariner (1878-1948) and husband, Thomas L. Mariner (1866-1918) are buried in the First Baptist Cemetery at Pocomoke on By-Pass Road. She was the mother of Mrs. L.R. Parsons, Mrs. Regie Marshall of Messongo, Lelia Mariner and Franklin B. Mariner.
4. William Raymond Bundick, born 13 August 1880, died 26 December 1908, by drowning. William Bundick, 22, married Manie Johnson, 17, in Somerset County on 30 August 1903 (LESMR 1865-1906, p. 60). They had an only son, Raymond W. Bundick (1906-1966). His mother married (2) Mr. Al Thornton of Horsey.
5. Dorendia Rennie Bundick, born 28 December 1882, died 1 March 1950. Rena B. Bundick, 19, married James D. Johnson, 22, on 24 November 1901 (Mar. Reg.

#4, p. 66). Rennie D. Johnson (1882-1950) and husband, James D. Johnson (1879-1964) are buried in Parksley Cemetery. They had a daughter, Mabel B. Johnson, and four sons: J. Marion Johnson, Norman R. Johnson, Ray Thomas Johnson and Randolph J. Johnson.

George Henry Bundick
The Tenth Generation

George Henry Bundick, the eldest of five children of George Bundick and his wife, Margaret Hester Satchell Bundick, was born on 13 January 1872. He lost his father in 1884, a few months after his 12th birthday.

As has been stated, George H. Bundick was attending Horntown Methodist Church in 1891 and was baptised there in 1896. He and his wife, Maggie E. Bundick, were both attending Temperanceville Methodist Church in 1897 and she became a member there, by certificate, on 18 January 1900 (Downings Church Records).

The 1900 Federal Census shows this George Bundick as head of household 357/360 in Atlantic District, a 27-year-old farmer, living on rented land. From the names of neighbors, he was living in the Temperanceville area. His wife, Maggie, born in Maryland, was also 27. They had been married two years, but had no children. His mother, Margaret (Satchell) Bundick was living with them, as were his brothers Calvin and William and sister Rennie Bundick. His 18-year-old "sister-in-law", Mary "Dickerson" (Danecker?) was also living with them.

Family records show that George Henry Bundick married (1) circa 1898, Margaret E. Danecker of Baltimore, whose family owned Danecker Clock Works there. They had evidently married in Baltimore, as no local record has been found. After her death on 4 August 1921 (obituary in Pen. Ent., 13 August 1921 issue), George Henry Bundick married (2) 1922-1923, Mary A. Byrus Fitzgerald, widow. The obituary of Margaret E. Bundick states that among her survivors was a brother, Mr. James Danecker, and three sisters, Mrs. Robert Byrus, Mrs. Charles Andrews, and Mrs. Mary Miller, all of Baltimore. Mary A. Byrus Fitzgerald was apparently the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Byrus, since George Henry Bundick's children spoke of her as "Cousin Mary".

On 22 November 1906, G.H. Bundick bought 225 acres of upland and 50 acres

of marsh, "known as the Onley farm", on the seaside near Assawoman, from George A.L. Winder and wife Millie A. for \$5000 (Deeds 86, p. 363). The land was bordered on the north by T. H. Taylor and wife and S. A. Taylor, east by Bridge Gut, south by S. Wilkins Matthews and west by Nock Road (present Arbuckle Neck Road).

The Census of 1910 shows George H. Bundick, a 37-year-old farmer, and his family, living in household 143/145, in Atlantic District on Arbuckle Neck Road. His wife Maggie was also 37. They had been married eleven years and had then had seven children, five of whom were living. His mother, Margaret Bundick, a 56-year-old widow, was living with them, as was his deceased brother William R. Bundick's widow, with her 3-year-old son.

An article on the front page of the April 27, 1929 issue of the Peninsula Enterprise reported that Mr. G. H. Bundick, of Assawoman, was critically ill at the home of his business partner, Mr. H. F. Ewell of Makemie Park, after suffering a stroke at his office there. This article continues by saying the "Mr. Bundick is known throughout the Eastern Shore of Virginia and Maryland, where he has been engaged in the produce business for the past twenty years". His obituary, in the May 4, 1929 issue of the same newspaper, states he died at Mr. Ewell's home on 26 April, at 57 years of age, that he was born at Tasley, but resided at Assawoman for a number of years. It continues that he was a very successful farmer and fertilizer dealer and one of the largest produce brokers in upper Accomack County. Besides his seven children, he was survived by his widow, three Fitzgerald step-children, and three grandchildren.

On 5 March 1928, George H. Bundick and wife Mary A. gave a deed to his brother, Calvin T. Bundick, for half his 275 acre tract near Assawoman (Deeds 134, p. 272). This deed states that George H. Bundick had sold this half to brother, William R. Bundick, but after his death had bought it back and that

Calvin T. Bundick had bought it on 20 December 1913 and had now paid for it in full. The remaining 131.63 acres was sold on 5 July 1930 at the Drug Store in Temperanceville at public auction, by Warner Ames, Special Commissioner (Deeds 139, p. 384). This land was labeled Tract B on a survey of December 1929 (Flat Book 3, p. 66) and was purchased by Calvin T. Bundick for \$8000. Calvin T. Bundick then owned the entire acreage. His home was on the western part of the land (Tract A), while the home of brother George H. Bundick was to the east. When George H. Bundick bought the land in 1906, the eastern portion contained an old home, built circa 1800. This house is now gone, but parts of it were used by his great-grandson, Terry Thomas, in his home near Temperanceville.

The children of George Henry Bundick, all born of his first wife, Margaret E. Daneker Bundick, were:

1. Margaret Esther Bundick, born 9 August 1900. When her mother died in 1921, Margaret was listed among her survivors as Mrs. Roland Marshall of Newport News. Tombstones in Assawoman Church Cemetery show: Roland C. Marshall, born 1899, died 1951, and Margaret B. Marshall, born 1900. Margaret E. Bundick, 20, married Roland Marshall, son of William T. and Florence Marshall, on 28 December 1920 (Mar. Reg. #4, p. 286). They had a daughter and four sons.

2. Harry Daneker Bundick, born 17 January 1902, died 13 June 1962. He married (1) Louise Corbin of Sanford (2) Mrs. Dorothy Robinson. He is buried in the George Washington Memorial Cemetery in Philadelphia, where he lived. He had an only daughter, Mrs. Eugenia W. Allison of New Jersey.

3. George William Bundick, born 2 June 1903, died 30 November 1962. He married Theola Stant of Sanford. They are buried in the J. W. Taylor Cemetery. Her stone gives her birth in 1905 and death in 1978. They had an only daughter, Mrs. Robert P. Ross.

4. Ernest Thomas Bundick, born 23 February 1905 and died as an infant.

5. Roy E. Bundick, born 30 June 1906 and died as an infant.
6. Lillie May Bundick, born 8 April 1907. She married Earl Darby and , as his widow, lives in Atlantic. They had no children.
7. Willie Blanche Bundick, born 17 August 1908. She married Rooker W. Hyslop. They live in Philadelphia and have no children.
8. Charles Henry Bundick, born 10 November 1910, died 4 July 1984. His tombstone is in Assawoman Church Cemetery and his widow lives in their home at Atlantic. Mr. Charlie Bundick married Marie Mears of Pocomoke. They had two daughters, Patsy Thomas and Shirley Watkinson.
9. Joanne Bundick, born 1912, died as an infant.
10. Joanne Elizabeth Bundick, born 29 April 1914, married Howard E. Birch of Chincoteague. Mrs. Birch had a kindergarten at Chincoteague for 24 years. She lost her husband in 1953 and has since made her home in Michigan, where her daughter lives. She also has a son.

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BUNDICKS
Addenda to Parksley Line

p. 21 and Chart II P - John F. Bundick, of the 7th generation. A John R. (F.?) Bundick married Jane Tyler circa 1825? (Mrs. Turnam's, Marriage Records of Accomack County, Virginia, 1776-1854, p. 47, gives this marriage but no date. A complete search of Marriage Registers and Marriage License Bonds does not show such a marriage at all). The 1850 census includes John F. Bundick, 46 farmer, as head of a household, with Ann E. Bundick, 21, and Mary J. Simpson, 8. Apparently John's wife was deceased by 1850 and Ann was a daughter. John F. Bundick does not show in the 1860 census (no record of his death between 1850 and 1860), but a Ann Bundick, 32, was head of a household in 1860, which included Jane Bundick at 6 years and Mary Simpson, 17. The census of 1870 gives Annie Bundick, 42, again head of a household, with two apparent daughters: Jane Bundick at 17 and Sarah Bundick at 11 years. Mary Simpson, 27, was also in the household. Jane E. Bundick, 17, "daughter of Anna", married William Twiford, 21, on 18 December 1870 (Mar. Reg. #3, p 29). The 1880 census lists Ann Bundick, 51, "mother-in-law", in the Lee District household of William Twyford.

p. 27 and Chart II P - William Bundick of George, of the 7th generation, born circa 1780, could have married before 1814, when he married Polly Davis at circa 34 years of age. It could have been he who married Atta Bunting on 24 July 1806 (Mar. Reg. #1, p. 1) and also the William Bundick who married Polly Parks by a bond of 28 October 1809 (MLB 1806-1832, p. 24).

p. 32, paragraph 2 and Chart II P - Thomas Bundick, of the 9th generation, son of George H. Bundick, had three daughters in 1880: Sarah A. Bundick, born circa 1871, married 1 January 1888, Maurie Justice (Mar. Reg. #3, p. 95); Willie Bundick, born circa 1873, married 30 December 1888, Calhoun J. Thornton (Mar. Reg. #3, p. 99); and Maggie Bundick, born circa 1878, married 29 December 1897, Charles Taylor, at Bloxom (Mar. Reg. #4, p. 20).

p. 32, paragraph 2 and Chart II P - Elizabeth Bundick, born circa 1841, of the 9th generation, daughter of George H. Bundick. Delete what I have on her. Elizabeth Bundick, 22, daughter of George and Ann Bundick, married 29 December 1864, William East of William, 32, at Accomack (this record has been found recently in the marriage license book dated 1864-1866, pages unnumbered and not indexed - the marriage was not recorded in the marriage registers). It was Elizabeth's daughter, Maggie East, aged 9, in the household of her brother William Bundick in 1880, labeled "niece".

page 29, paragraph 3 and Chart II P - William Bundick, born circa 1824 (1850 census), son of George and wife Polly Davis Bundick, married (1) 18 April 1849, in Norfolk, Princess Anne County, Virginia, Pemmy McClanahan (38 in 1850). They had, at least, one son:

1. Perry Westly Bundick, born 6 June 1850 in Norfolk, died 13 April 1931 in Independence, Montgomery County, Kansas, married 29 May 1881, Mary Elizabeth Poole, in Augusta, Butler County, Kansas. They had five children:
 - A. Ruth Edna Bundick, born 1883, died 1933, married 1905, Robert Royce Nichol.
 - B. Russell Oscar Bundick, born 1885, died 1970, married 1910, Clara Eliz. Wyatt.
 - C. Baby Bundick, born and died 1888.
 - D. Mary Helen Bundick, born 1891, died 1944.
 - E. Phyllis Pauline Bundick, born 1895, died 1965.

The 1900 Federal Census gives William Bundick, born February 1823, still living in Princess Anne County, Virginia. His wife was then Sarah J. Bundick, born October 1855, and their children were: William A. Bundick, born 1878; Pearle F. Bundick, born 1883; Henry C. Bundick, born 1885; Dar (?) Bundick, born 1888 (daughter). Apparently this was a second marriage for William Bundick, circa 1875.

page 29, paragraph 5 and Chart II P - John Bundick of William, born 1832, married Lovey F. Hickman in 1861. Their children were:

1. William Williams Bundick, born 19 December 1865, circa 16 May 1915 (tombstone Parksley Cemetery), married 27 January 1886, at 22, in Wicomico County, Maryland, Nancy Wessells, 19 (LES, MD, Mar. Rec., p. 60). They had three children:

A. Manie L. Bundick, born 1887, died 1952 (tombstone at Fairview Lawn), married 27 November 1907, Lee Wessells (Mar. Reg. #4, p. 140). F. Lee Wessells, born 1885, died 1962, also at Fairview Lawn.

B. Bessie Williams Bundick, born 1891, died 1973 (tombstone at Parksley Cemetery), married 4 July 1911, Dorsey Cleveland Core (Mar. Reg. # 4, p. 180). He was born in 1889 and died in 1984 (tombstone). One of their children was Mary Viola Core, who married James O. Gladding of Oak Hall in 1936 (Boston Family of Maryland, p. 612).

C. William R. Bundick or Roy W. Bundick, born 1894, died 1970 (tombstone at Parksley Cemetery), married circa 1915, Laura Virginia Matthews (no local record). Her obituary (Pen. Ent., April 1, 1954) gives two daughters: Mrs. Lynwood W. Niblett of East Point and Mrs. Gloucester P. Gladding of Hopeton. A son, William Roy Bundick, Jr. died in 1936 (Wills 23, p. 180). The 1920 census shows W. R. Bundick, 25, with wife L. V. Bundick, 21, and a 1-year-old daughter, Madlin V. Bundick.

2. Columbus Washington Bundick, born 1868, died 1959 (tombstone in Parksley Cemetery, married 26 December 1888, Missouri E. Matthews (Mar. Reg. #3, p. 99). The 1900 census shows they had an 8-year-old daughter, Pearlle Powell Bundick. The obituary of Columbus W. Bundick (Pen. Ent., 18 June 1959 issue) states he was survived only by four sisters. His wife, born 1871, had died in 1948 (tombstone).

3. Polly Ann Bundick, married 6 May 1892, William T. Bundick (Mar. Reg. #3, p. 116).

4. Maggie E. Bundick, married 28 December 1892, William T. Dix, (" ", p. 118).

5. Emma Bundick, married 10 November 1897, Thaddeus C. Evans (Mar. Reg. #4, p. 18).

6. Isabelle C. Bundick, married 13 December 1897, Frank G. Riley (" ", p. 20).

7. John Thomas Bundick (his name looked like John F. Bundick in the 1900 census), born 1882, died 1957 (tombstone in Parksley Cemetery), married 13 October 1901, Henrietta Middleton, in Somerset County, Maryland (LES, MD, Mar. Rec., p. 60). Henrietta Bundick, wife of J. T., was born in 1880 and died in 1917 (tombstone). The 1920 census shows J. Tom Bundick, 37, as head of a household that did not include a wife, but five children. The obituary of John Thomas Bundick (Pen. Ent., 3 October 1957 issue) states he lived at Leemont and was survived by the same five children:

A. Pearle M. Bundick, born circa 1903, unmarried when her father died in 1957.

B. Edward C. Bundick, born circa 1907, of Baltimore when father died in 1957.

C. Lois Bundick, born circa 1909, Mrs. Nealy Prescott of Leemont when her father died in 1957.

D. Mooreland N. Bundick, born circa 1911. A tombstone at Guilford Church: Mooreland H. Bundick, husband of Sylvia G. Bundick, born 1910, died 1981.

E. Brantley Bundick, born circa 1913. Tombstones in Parksley Cemetery are inscribed: Brantley W. Bundick, born 1912- , and Juanita P. Bundick, born 1918, died 1983.

page 30, paragraph 6 and Chart II P - Thomas Bundick, born 1836, died 1924, and wife, Mary E. Sparrow Bundick, had:

1. Sarah Ann/Sadie Bundick, born 1862, died 1941 (tombstone in Nelsons Cemetery) married (1) 29 January 1879, James H. Gunter, at Zion Church (Mar. Reg. #3, p. 87), (2) 31 December 1885, John H. Marshall, son of Thomas E. Marshall and wife Charlotte, at Chincoteague (Mar. Reg. #3, p. 87). She, a widow, was living in an old hotel in New Church when she died.

2. Alice L. Bundick, born circa 1864 (1880 census), married 9 December 1886, Edward B. Justice (Mar. Reg. #3, p. 86).

3. William T. Bundick, born 6 December 1867, died 24 February 1938 (tombstone in Parksley Cemetery), married 30 October 1889, Sallie D. Wright, daughter of Charles and Margaret Wright. The obituary of William T. Bundick states he lived at Parksley and was survived by four daughters and a son (Pen. Ent., 4 March 1938 issue). His wife's tombstone gives her birth on 22 May 1861 and death on 1 September 1932. Their children were:

A. Charles T. Bundick, born 1891, died 1964 (tombstone in Parksley Cemetery), married 24 December 1913, Helen Thomas Shrieves (Mar. Reg. #4, p. 208). His obituary states he died 24 October 1964 at 73 years (Pen. Ent., 29 October 1964 issue). He was survived by his wife, Mrs. Helen Shrieves Bundick, a daughter, Mrs. Leona Phillips of Pocomoke City and a son, Charles Edward Bundick.

B. Carrie L. Bundick, born 1892, died ? (tombstone at Parksley Cemetery), married 1912, Floyd Samuel Bull, son of Henry and Hennie Bull (Mar. Reg. #4, p. 196).

C. Gertrude S. Bundick, born circa 1894 (1900 census), unmarried when her father died in 1938 and when her brother died in 1964.

D. Jewel M. Bundick, born circa 1896 (1900 census), unmarried when her father died in 1938, and Mrs. Columbus Chase when her brother died in 1964.

E. Lula A. Bundick, born circa 1898 (1900 census), married 23 December 1920. Tankard G. Kellam, Jr., of Onancock (Mar. Reg. #4, p. 284).

4. Mary E. Bundick, born 20 February 1872, died 24 January 1962 (tombstone in Parksley Cemetery), married 12 February 1890, John D. Watts (Mar. Reg. #3, p. 105). Her obituary states she was survived by five children, among them being Mrs. Charles T. Huckstep, Paul F. Watts and Howard Watts of Parksley.

5. Eva S. Bundick, born 7 May 1874, died 27 August 1907 (tombstone in Parksley Cemetery), married 28 December 1893, in Worcester County, Maryland, Morris E. Scott (LES, MD, Mar. Rec., p. 60).

6. Edward J. Bundick, born circa 1877 (1880 census). Edward J. Bundick was living in Wilmington, Delaware, in 1938, when his brother William T. Bundick died, and in 1948, when brother John D. Bundick died. There is a tombstone in Parksley Cemetery for Edward J. Bundick, born 1875, died 1954. Apparently he was not married.

7. John D. Bundick, born 1880, died 1948 (tombstone in Parksley Cemetery). His tombstone indicates he was the husband of Etta B. Bundick, born 1883, died 1933, but no marriage record has been found. His obituary gives five children: Mrs. Clinton E. Simms of Arlington, Mrs. Leo Medermott and Miss Jacquelyn Bundick of Chester, Miss Claudine Bundick of Baltimore, and a son, Mr. Austin Bundick of Chester (Pen. Ent., 20 August 1948 issue).

8. Oscar L. Bundick, Sr., born 1883, died 1959 (tombstone in Edgehill Cemetery), married 30 November 1902, in Worcester County, Maryland, Ella (Etta?) Mason (LES, MD, Mar. Rec., p. 60). Henrietta M. Bundick, wife of O. L. Bundick, was born in 1884 and died in 1947 (tombstone). The obituary of Oscar Lee Bundick, Sr. (Pen. Ent., 3 September 1959 issue) states he died on 29 August 1959 at 76 years of age and his survivors were two daughters, Mrs. George Bradford of Frankford, Delaware, and Mrs. Burton Chittum, of Ocean View, Delaware and seven sons. They were: Mason L Bundick, Cecil Bundick and Wilson Bundick of Accomac; William Bundick of Wilmington, Delaware;

Marion Bundick of Mount Ranier, Maryland, and Oscar Bundick, Jr., of Ocean View, Delaware. He was also survived by a sister, Mrs. John D. Watts of Parksley, thirty-two grandchildren, and ten great-grandchildren.
